Chair & CEO Report 2025

This year the Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland marks its 40th anniversary celebrating four decades of standing alongside communities across Northern Ireland, investing in the people and organisations working hardest to create a more inclusive and sustainable society.

When we look back over our forty years of grant-making, what strikes us most is not the figures, though they are a source of genuine pride to our dedicated team of staff and trustees, but the trusted relationships we have built, the resilience we have been privileged to support, and the communities that have continued to find ways to thrive even in the most challenging of times.

This anniversary year felt like the right moment to do something different so alongside our established programmes, we launched two special initiatives - THRIVE and 40 Invest - designed to invest in the long-term strength and sustainability of organisations. Both programmes are described in more detail in the pages that follow, but what unites them is a shared conviction that when charities are well-resourced and well-supported, the communities they serve are better placed to flourish.

THRIVE was delivered in close partnership with our sister Foundations Lloyds Bank Foundation for England and Wales, Lloyds Bank Foundation for the Channel Islands, and Bank of Scotland Foundation. It was made possible through an additional anniversary donation from Lloyds Banking Group, and we are deeply grateful for that generosity and the spirit of collaboration that has always defined our relationship with our funder.

Our 40 Invest programme focused on charities working to strengthen their foundations for the future building the governance, capacity and organisational health that will sustain their work for years to come.

Beyond the anniversary programmes, it was a year defined by the breadth of need we continued to see across Northern Ireland and by the extraordinary commitment of the organisations meeting it. In a time of ongoing financial pressure, rising demand and significant uncertainty for the voluntary and community sector, the charities we fund have demonstrated remarkable resilience,

passion and dedication. We have tried to meet that with a funding response that is flexible, relational and genuinely responsive.

Our partnership with Lloyds Banking Group continued to be a source of strength beyond the money. The Skills Based Volunteering programme including mentoring, Charity Response Forums and the Skills Exchange Programme saw increased uptake this year, with more of our grantees drawing on the expertise of Lloyds Banking Group colleagues to tackle strategic challenges and build internal capacity. We strongly believe that this kind of non-financial support is as valuable as the grants we award, and we will continue to develop and champion it.

We are also proud of the continued success of the Matched Giving Scheme, through which 153 matched-giving claims were approved this year, each one representing a Lloyds Banking Group colleague who chose to give their time or fundraise for a cause they care about in Northern Ireland.

This year also saw us move to a new home at Black Mountain Shared Space, a place that embodies the values of partnership, inclusion and reconciliation that are so central to our own.

Forty years is a significant chapter. But it is the next chapter shaped by the communities we serve, the partners we work alongside, and the organisations we are proud to fund that we are most looking forward to writing together.

Knitted Knockers



Knitted Knockers of NI Ltd received £5,486 from the Community FLEX programme towards facilitator and material costs, to produce hand knit breast prosthetics and post-surgery comfort kits to breast cancer survivors across Northern Ireland.

How We Work

We want applying for a grant to feel straightforward and supportive. Here is what the journey looks like from first contact to evaluation.



Pre-Application

We offer monthly online pre-application sessions and one-to-one calls to help you understand whether our programmes are the right fit for your organisation. Contact us at grants@halifaxfoundationni.org to book in.



Application

Once received, your application is checked for completeness and eligibility. If anything is missing, we will be in touch and give you one week to provide it.



Assessment

A Grants Officer will be assigned to your application and will contact you to discuss it further. They will produce a report for the Grants Team, who will agree a recommendation together.



Decision

Applications are presented to our Grants Committee, who meet approximately every nine weeks. Recommendations go to our Board of Trustees for final ratification. Please allow around 12 weeks from submission to decision.



Acceptance

You will receive a Grant Acceptance email. Your chair must sign and return the terms and conditions and provide payment details, after which your grant will be paid in full.



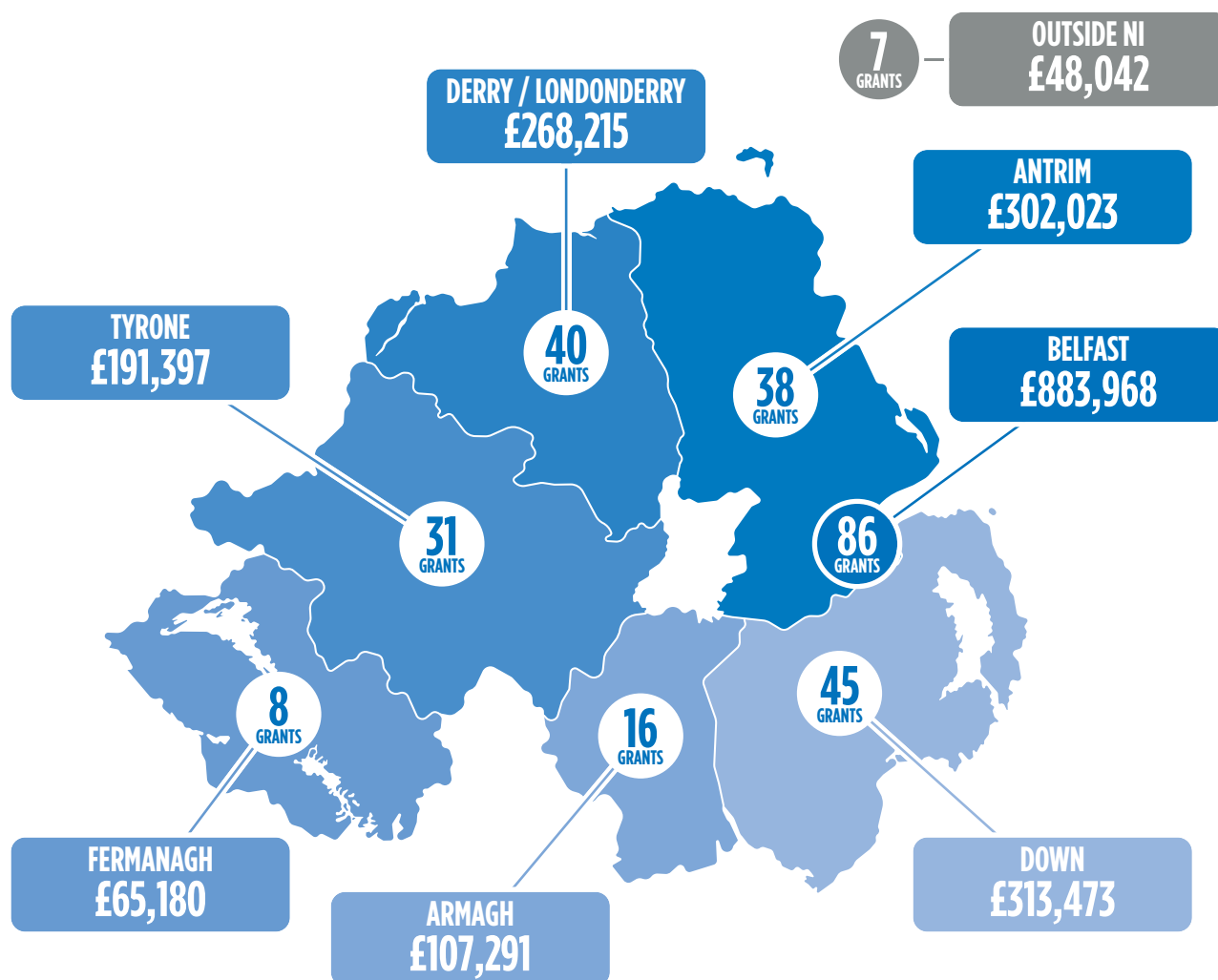
Monitoring and Evaluation

You may be asked to provide progress reports during your grant period. At the end of your funding, you will be asked to complete an evaluation form capturing the impact of your grant and how it was spent. You may also receive a visit from a member of our team.

Grants Overview 2025

2025 was a milestone year and one where our support was needed more than ever. Across Northern Ireland, VCSE organisations continued to face rising need, reduced statutory funding, and the ongoing pressures of the cost-of-living crisis. Against that backdrop, we remained committed to ensuring that those facing the greatest challenges were not left behind.

In total, we committed 271 grants totalling £2,179,589 supporting organisations working across homelessness, financial resilience, disability, mental health, early years, employability, and more. Our grantees told us that 216,279 people would directly benefit from this investment.

Circle of Support



COS for Autism Families received £10,000 from the Community FLEX programme towards a part time salary, for the charity which supports people with autism and their families and carers in the North West.

Our Grant Programmes

Community FLEX

Our flagship programme. Community FLEX offers responsive, flexible funding for organisations addressing immediate community need. Grants of up to £10,000 are available for one year, giving charities the freedom to respond quickly to what their communities require most.

Community FLEX supported 226 organisations with grants totalling £1,325,899.

CROSSFIRE TRUST – ARMAGH



Among the many causes supported by the Foundation in 2025 were organisations tackling homelessness and housing insecurity. Through flexible funding and wraparound support, charities are not only providing immediate relief but creating sustainable pathways out of homelessness.

One of those organisations was Crossfire Trust in Armagh who received £9,250 for a support worker salary from our Community FLEX programme.

Ian Bothwell, Director of Crossfire Trust, said the support they received was vital in ensuring that they could provide support for their residents. “Crossfire Trust looks after people who need somewhere to live,” he explained. “We care for their emotional needs and our residents repay us by contributing to the maintenance of the house and grounds. They are no longer homeless when they come here.

“The Halifax Foundation for NI have been a joy to work with. They were approachable and the communication was excellent. The funding we received helped us to plan ahead and remain open.”

“Crossfire Trust helped me when I needed it most. The support I have received has made me stronger and I repay the kindness they have shown me by helping out around the grounds. Our Grant Programmes

IGNITE

Every organisation has to start somewhere and our IGNITE programme aims to help newly established registered charities take their first steps offering seeding grants of up to £2,000 alongside mentoring and training support. Open to charities registered within the last two years and working with people in greatest need, it is designed for organisations with limited funds and a clear mission.

IGNITE provided 9 grants totalling £16,665.

WEE CHICKS – BELFAST



For the families who walk through the door each morning, Wee Chicks is simple: it is somewhere their children are known, welcomed and well looked after. What families rarely see is everything that has to be in place behind the scenes to make that possible: the website that helps them find the service, the phone line that connects them, the bookkeeping that keeps the organisation accountable, the registrations and memberships that keep it compliant and safe.

Based in Belfast, Wee Chicks provides inclusive childcare and family development support to 75 families in an area of high deprivation. A grant of £2,000 from the Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland was directed entirely at these less visible, but essential, core costs. This is the kind of funding that is often hardest to secure, and yet without which none of the frontline work would be possible.

“Our experience of working with Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland was really positive. The support felt personal, encouraging and understanding of the reality of running a small community organisation. For organisations like ours, these costs are essential. They are what allow the frontline work to happen, even though they are not always easy to fund,” – Kelly Molloy, Wee Chicks

Our Grant Programmes

COLLABORATE

We have always believed that good collaboration produces something that no single organisation can achieve alone. COLLABORATE puts that ambition into practice, bringing two or more charities together to tackle a shared social issue at local level. Grants of up to £20,000 are available for one to two years, with collaboration training provided as part of the programme. All participating charities must have an income of £500,000 or less and be working with people in greatest need. It is a rolling programme, and we are proud to be able to support approximately five to ten collaborating partnerships each year.

6 organisations benefited from £100,761 in COLLABORATE funding.

DIVERSE YOUTH NI - BELFAST



“The support from Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland came at exactly the right time. For many of the young people we work with, Diverse Youth NI is much more than a youth organisation. It is a place where they feel welcomed, supported, and understood,” explained Israel Eguaghi. “This funding allowed us to continue being there for them every week, whether that was helping with schoolwork, creating opportunities to build friendships, developing confidence and leadership skills, or simply providing a trusted adult who would listen.

Bangor Foodbank



Bangor Foodbank received £12,784 from the COLLABORATE programme towards the Nest Programme, a collaboration between Bangor Foodbank and Home Start North Down, to provide holistic support to new mums suffering with perinatal mental health issues.

Our Grant Programmes

EMPOWER

The voluntary and community sector in Northern Ireland depends not just on the charities delivering frontline services, but on the infrastructure organisations that support, connect and strengthen them. EMPOWER is designed to invest in exactly that important structure, offering grants of up to £20,000 over one to two years to established, regional or sub-regional infrastructure charities. Applications must be strategic or transformational in nature.

10 grants totalling £198,334 were awarded.

BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB - NI



A grant of £18,776 over two years from the Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland's EMPOWER programme supported the development of youth work in rural areas helping clubs put basic infrastructure in place and giving the volunteers the chance to upskill. Better-supported volunteers mean better, safer services for the children and young people who depend on them.

“The Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland are absolutely amazing, the best funder we have ever worked with. The Foundation staff truly care about our work, and that is the difference between them and others. They want to hear about what you do, and what else they can do to support your work further which is not a common approach with funders. Our Grant Programmes

THRIVE - 40th Anniversary Programme

THRIVE was made possible by an additional anniversary donation from Lloyds Banking Group, delivered in partnership with our sister Foundations across the UK. Designed to support charities helping people build long-term financial resilience, it provided two-year grants of up to £15,000, plus £2,500 for organisational development. The programme recognised something we see repeatedly in the communities we fund: that financial difficulty and other challenges, mental health, housing, isolation, rarely exist alone. The organisations we supported through THRIVE understand that too, and their work reflects it.

10 grants totalling £140,781 were awarded through THRIVE.

LISTENING EAR – NEWTOWNABBEY



Founded by Brian and Karen Kerr, the first people in Northern Ireland to qualify as Listening Ear trainers, the organisation has trained and supported over 100 local people to listen. It provides a genuine wrap-around service spanning mental health support, debt and benefits advice, housing support and suicide prevention, alongside a thriving community fridge, all delivered at grass-roots level within the community.

Support from the Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland's THRIVE programme enabled Listening Ear to invest in training for its staff and volunteers, helping the team stay up to date with legislation across the full breadth of their work a vital foundation for high-quality, trustworthy support.

With the cost-of-living crisis increasing demand for their services, the grant has helped ensure the team is equipped to keep providing person-centred support when their community needs it most: **“This grant is helping us provide important support to our local community when they need it most – it is so important that we continue to provide the space for people to listen to each other.” – Karen Kerr, Founder Manager, Listening Ear**

Our Grant Programmes

40 Invest - 40th Anniversary Programme

40 Invest was created specifically to mark our 40th year and to invest, in the most meaningful sense of the word, in the future of the sector. Open to registered charities with an income of £250,000 or less, it offered two-year grants of up to £40,000, plus £5,000 for organisational development. The focus was on governance, capacity and the kind of organisational health that sustains good work beyond the lifetime of any single grant. Ten organisations received funding through 40 Invest.

10 grants totalling £397,149 were awarded.

LIFE CHANGE CHANGES LIVES – DOWNPATRICK



The idea behind Life Change Changes Lives was born in New York, when founders Manus and Ailish Teague watched young people paint furniture and start to open up. Recognising that the creative act of restoration could work on all age ranges, they brought that insight home to Downpatrick, building an organisation that provides a safe, welcoming space for people facing mental health challenges, addiction and social isolation. The organisation also provides important support to those most deeply affected by suicide, survivors of attempts, people in crisis, and the families and loved ones left behind by loss.

Support from the Foundation's 40 Invest programme contributed to core operational costs including heating, lighting, salary and counselling costs, project materials and website development as well as the digitisation of services, helping LCCL run more efficiently as it continues to grow: **"We have been blessed by the support we have received from the Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland. Over the years they have been a constant for us offering support, advice and grants every step of the way.**

"They don't expect us to develop a project, they believe in our work and want to fund what we do which is so important. "The support goes beyond the funding. The team are amazing. They are always there to offer support and advice and we have built a trusted relationship with them they have been by our side as our organisation has grown." – Ailish Teague, Operations Manager, Life Change Changes Lives

Not Just a Grant-maker

We are proud to be able to bring two sectors together, the Community and Voluntary sector and the Private sector, a collaboration that transform lives and communities.

This unique partnership has allowed us to continue to be more than a grant-maker as we understand that funding alone is not enough. In 2025, we increased our investment in organisational sustainability.

These initiatives strengthen leadership, improve

governance, and ensure charities are digitally equipped to meet increasing demand.

Through our partnership with Lloyds Banking Group, we are able to offer our grantees something more: access to skills, expertise and support that can make a lasting difference to how organisations operate and grow.

In 2025, we saw increased uptake of non-financial support across our grantee community – a trend we are proud of and committed to building on.

East Antrim U3A



East Antrim U3A received £3,000 from the Community FLEX programme towards decorating costs and the purchase of new doors, for the older people's group based in East Antrim.

Charity Mentoring Programme



The mentoring programme pairs senior Lloyds Banking Group colleagues with Foundation grantees, creating a supportive, developmental relationship that benefits both parties. Mentors share knowledge, skills and fresh perspectives; mentees develop as leaders and strengthen their organisations. All mentors volunteer their time, and the programme includes accredited training delivered by our partners, Advance Coaching.

“The mentoring programme has been invaluable in providing me with a safe space to reflect on a range of challenges beyond day-to-day delivery.” – Judith Rankin, Sported Foundation

Mornington Community Projects based in south Belfast has received a number of grants from Halifax Foundation for NI totalling more than £92,000 since 2013.

The grants have provided vital support for the organisation and has allowed the staff to continue to deliver a range of services to the

local community. More recently the organisation received support through the Foundation’s Strengthening Resilience initiative offering staff the opportunity to work with a Mentor to build skills and capacity.

“We were delighted to be able to avail of the mentoring support from Halifax Foundation for NI. Jordan has been such a help and we have gained so much advice and support from him. Support Beyond Funding

Charity Response Forums

These facilitated sessions bring charities together with a team of Lloyds Banking Group colleagues drawing on expertise in risk management, digital, leadership, project management and communications to explore challenges, test ideas and develop practical solutions together.

Skills Exchange Programme

The Skills Exchange Programme matches a charity with a small dedicated team of colleagues for a six-month period of tailored support. Together, they work on a specific challenge or opportunity whether that is

strategy development, governance, communications or business planning.

Other Collaborative Initiatives

We also work with a range of partners to provide support where it is most needed, including:

- NICVA – pre-application training on collaboration for COLLABORATE applicants, and post-grant fundraising training for grant holders.
- CO3 – a Financial Resilience workshop series delivered to small charities across eight regional areas.
- Clarke & Co Accountants – bespoke financial governance training for charities who need it.

Funders Forum for Northern Ireland

The Funders Forum for Northern Ireland brings together charitable trusts, foundations and bodies distributing public funds in a confidential space to share insight, support one another and work towards better, more coordinated funding practice across the region. Our CEO Brenda McMullan is Vice-Chair a role that reflects the Foundation's standing in the sector and our genuine commitment to the Forum's purpose.

We believe that how money is given matters as much as how much is given, and the Forum is the space where funders across Northern Ireland can do the harder work of learning from each other, identifying gaps, and occasionally speaking with a collective voice on the issues that matter most to the communities we all serve.

Matched Giving Scheme



The Matched Giving Scheme enables Lloyds Banking Group and Halifax colleagues across Northern Ireland to support causes close to their hearts with every pound they raise or donate matched by the Foundation. Colleagues can claim up to £1,000 per year, covering fundraising, donations and voluntary time (at £10 per hour).

In 2025, the Foundation approved 153 matched-giving claims a testament to the commitment of colleagues who found creative and inspiring ways to give back, despite ongoing pressures on charitable fundraising. From gala events and bake sales to volunteering with local sports clubs and parent-teacher associations, their efforts generated vital unrestricted funding for charities across Northern Ireland.

Crisis and Simon Community Partnership

Since the launch of the partnership between Crisis and Simon Community in Northern Ireland in April 2023, the commitment shown by Lloyds Banking Group colleagues across the Group has been extraordinary. Through rollercoaster hikes, Christmas quizzes, marathons and thousands of hours of volunteering, they have raised over £4 million as of July 2025, a figure that speaks for itself. More than 25,000 colleagues have completed a co-developed homelessness awareness module, deepening their understanding of the issue and their ability to advocate for lasting change.

In Northern Ireland, those efforts are directly supporting Simon Community's work with people in temporary accommodation or at risk of homelessness, helping them move towards stable, long-term housing. We are grateful to every colleague who has played their part.

Coleraine Street Pastors



A Community FLEX grant from the Halifax Foundation for Northern Ireland enabled Coleraine Street Pastors to retain a part-time member of staff for ten hours a week support that proved pivotal to the smooth running of the organisation.
